Hi everyone, my name is Mia and this is my testimony.

There was a time that I had to ask God just to take my life, and I just wanted to give up life at that point. I was very broken, and I had hit my rock bottom. I felt like I could not do it all alone, and I feared for our lives day by day.

The hardest part is that I have to show my kids that I am the strongest person because I am all they have left. I have to be their mother and father. Playing both roles as a parent is never easy. I made a lot of mistakes and wrong decisions in the past. My children and I had to rebuild and start again after moving back here from Canada. But since we started coming here at SBCC, I have noticed a lot of changes in my life. I chose to follow God and walk with him even in my lowest moments.

I didn't know what my purpose was in this world before I started becoming a Christian until I trusted in the Lord more and drew myself into him. The first experience I had was when Pastor Cory spoke on Father's Day service back in 2022 about a father's love, and he showed on that video a father together with his son, who has special needs, and they had to do a triathlon, and that was an amazing story. That was also the first scenario of me wanting to hear more about God and his good work in the lives of others. My son also has special needs, and I never felt loved, cared for, acknowledged, included, or most of all, accepted until I went to South Bay Community Church. God has sent me and my kids to this church for a reason. I am thankful that my aunt introduced me and my kids to this church, and I am thankful to our senior pastors, Greg and Gary, because they welcomed me and my kids to this community with an open heart.

As a single mother, I never felt this kind of love from people that I didn't even know, and despite all of my circumstances and my status in life, even though we are all not related to each other, they still found ways to help us and provide us with extra help, especially when we needed that help. I kept going to church despite the distance, the location of the church, and being a single mom with two kids and one with special needs. I also want to experience His goodness and be able to heal from all the wounds and agonies that I have experienced in the past. Even though my kids do not have a father, they finally know the love of The Father who is our father in heaven. And I want the kids to learn and grow in faith and we found that kind of love here at SBCC.

I am healing every day, and sometimes we never want to talk about what breaks us, but we have to remember that being broken does not mean we are less good than others or less worthy than others. Being broken also means God can restore and renew a person into the best and greatest version of their lives, no matter what has happened or what situation they have had in the past. I learned more about how to forgive by holding grudges against the people who had hurt us and our kids and verbally, physically, mentally, and spiritually abused us. It was never easy because there is some point at which the flashbacks will come back and you will remember all of the pain and suffering a person put you through. You can find happiness through God; you do not need to stay somewhere where you are not safe. I learned how to surrender it all to the Lord.

I learned to love myself now and to put myself first. It is very hard to forgive, but it is clear and written in the Bible. If our God forgives, so can we. And when you pray for people who have hurt you and for your sins, believe that you will be more blessed and that you will receive blessings from God in all other places. He sends you his angels. What I mean by that is that he sends you the right people into your life to mold you and help you grow in faith. I used to feel emptiness inside of me. I started hanging out with the wrong crowd. I did not have parents guiding me so I was on my own. I did not have my father growing up and I did not have any support from my mom. I got into tough situations and used to pray to God to get me out of certain situations. I always believed in God and knew that he was there helping me, always getting me out of troubles. The loneliness and emptiness that I felt turned me to drinking and smoking marijuana. Anna and I became alcoholics and we struggled with our relationship.

At that time, we had a one-year-old daughter, Celeste. One day, while Anna and I were having a fight, our neighbor called the police and reported us. The next day, while I was at home alone with our daughter, the policemen and the Child Services came knocking at our door and took our daughter away. She was placed in foster care, and I visited her twice a week just to be with her. That was the most difficult time of my life. I called the people I knew in the community who were Christians. I started going to Church with them. During one of the services, the Pastor challenged people to come forward if they wanted to commit their lives to Jesus. I came to the front and told Jesus that I commit my life to Him. I could not stop crying!

I missed my daughter so much; I did everything that they wanted me to do to get her back. After 8 months, we were able to get Celeste back. That was the happiest day of my life!

We went on to have another child. A Son. Sergio III. However, we continued to struggle with our relationship and our alcohol problem. We kept trying to work on our relationship, but it did not work out. I decided to join my relatives in Fremont, CA, so I moved up there. Then Anna started calling me and we started talking again. In one of my visits with them, while crossing the street, I was assaulted by a stranger from behind. They pushed me to the ground. I could not move. A Christian woman kept talking to me to keep me awake and she managed to get my relative's phone number from me.

Finally, I was taken to the hospital. I became paralyzed from the neck down. I was told that I had a severe spinal cord injury, declared quadriplegic and given a 3 percent chance to walk again.

After 3 surgeries and having been in the hospital for a while. I was finally moved to Baycrest Center. I was completely bedridden and could not move. That's where I met my friend Annie Mason. I always get visits from her, Lauren and Bob, they always prayed for me. Through prayers, they saw my progress! They saw me when I was able to sit up, stand up and take steps.

Then, when I finally went home, I had another battle to fight. My neighbors were mean to me, several times, they told me that I should have died that day and my girlfriend should have left me. After a few months of being home with my family, Anna told me that she did not have a connection with me anymore and that I had to move out. She said she found another man. I was dealing with a lot. This was very painful for me to hear. I had to leave my children and find another place to live. All through these struggles and difficult times, I never lost faith in God. I knew that God is always with me. Annie and Lauren and Bob have always been there for me. So I reached out to them and I told them, I'm ready to turn myself to the Lord, to God and yeah!

I want to follow Jesus. I have been crucified with Jesus. It is no longer I who live but Jesus who lives in me. The life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God who loved me and gave himself for me. I want to grow in my faith. I've been attending church services and just recently brought my daughter, Celeste! I attended my first Bible Study online with Scott and joined the Chronic Illness Lifegroup with Sister Tina.
